

The Mile End campus is historically the home of Queen Mary College, which began life in 1885 as the People's Palace, a philanthropic endeavour to prove East Londoners with education and social activities. It was admitted to the University of London in 1915.

University of London

About Queen Mary

A campus university

At Queen Mary students do not have to spend time travelling from site to site to attend classes and seminars – all facilities from housing, to classrooms, to libraries are available on one campus.

Queen Mary is the only university in London to have a completely self-contained campus. More than 2000 students live in high-quality, affordable accommodation either on the campus or within a few minutes' walk, making it a great place not only to study but also to relax and socialise. Although some of the College buildings date back to the 1880s, the campus has benefitted enormously from substantial investment and expansion in recent years.

The award-winning Student Village contains residences, a grocery shop, a launderette, a bank and a central reception as well as a 24 hour security office. Located in the centre is the Curve, a 200 seat restaurant offering hot and cold meals and a coffee bar. Other places to eat and drink on campus include Mucci's Italian restaurant, the Students' Union bar, The Drunken Monkey oriental restaurant and Ground coffee shop.

Academic facilities include an extensive library, a purpose-built building for medical sciences and an award-winning Informatics Teaching Laboratory.

The recently opened ArtsTwo building provides comprehensive teaching facilities for over 1000 students. These include the Harold Pinter

Drama Studio, a flexible performance space seating up to 80 people, a modern computer network, satellite and video-viewing rooms, a film-editing suite and language laboratories.

Other campus amenities include a bookshop, Health Centre and an Advice and Counselling Service. All in all, Queen Mary's extensive urban campus provides most day to day needs, allowing students to spend less time travelling from place to place and more time making the most out of their Study Abroad experience!

Accommodation

Study Abroad students are usually offered accommodation on Queen Mary's Mile End campus in modern, self-catered flats, All rooms are single and the majority have ensuite (private) bathroom facilities. Typically rooms are grouped in flats for between four and six students with shared kitchen facilities. All rooms are carpeted, equipped with a single bed. wardrobe. bookshelves. desk. chair and storage space. Many rooms contain their own mini-fridge. Kitchens are fully equipped with refrigerators, freezers, cookers, storage cupboards, food preparation areas and dining areas. Study Abroad students are placed in mixed flats allowing them to live with students from the UK and many other countries. Limited single gender housing and accessible housing for students with disabilities is also available.

Students' Union, sports and social life

The focal point of social life at the College is the Students' Union.

Every Queen Mary student automatically becomes a member of the Queen Mary Students' Union (QMSU), the University of London Union (ULU) and the National Union of Students (NUS). On campus the Students' Union manage the student bar, shops, a café, sports facilities and offices which offer student support and representation services. The Students' Union is the focus of sport and recreation at the College. Queen Mary has a variety of opportunities for participation in sport. though the emphasis here is on participation for all, not just elite athletes, offering everyone the chance to get involved.

The Students' Union building also has a wellequipped gym, squash courts, a sports hall and saunas. Supervised classes such as fitness training, circuit training, weight training, spin, yoga and aerobics are held regularly during term time

Personal support

While at Queen Mary students have the support of a dedicated Study Abroad team who are happy to advise on any matter: personal. academic and financial. The team is the first point of contact for students on the programme. from admission right the way through to departure from the university.

Events and social programme

Throughout the semester the Study Abroad Office organises a programme of events and activities to help students on the Study Abroad programme meet and get to know one another, as well as students studying for full degrees at Queen Mary.

As part of the welcome and orientations programme events that are usually run include a boat cruise on the River Thames and a guided bus tour of London. Further events are run throughout the semester by the Study Abroad team once students have settled into their classes. Recent events have included:

- A tour of the nearby 2012 Olympic Park
- Football (soccer) match at one of the London Premiership grounds
- Visit to Shakespeare's Globe Theatre
- Traditional Afternoon High Tea
- A backstage tour of the National Theatre
- Thanksgiving Dinner
- Cricket match at Lords (spiritual home of world cricket)



Living in London

The Queen Mary Study Abroad programme offers students the opportunity to experience one of the greatest cities in the world. London is not just a capital city – the centre of British politics and government - it is an international centre of excellence for business, culture and the arts.

London is a city of contrasts; it is a modern bustling metropolis, home to seven million people and workplace for many millions more. but it is also an ancient city dating back to Roman times, a city where history awaits the explorer around every corner.

Fast London


Queen Mary is situated in the heart of east London, an area with a rich history which is now one of the city's most vibrant and cosmopolitan areas.

There are delightful contrasts to be found here. from the bustle of street markets to peaceful walks along Regent's Canal and through Victoria Park, cafés and restaurants to traditional pubs. museums and art galleries. Despite being one of London's oldest areas, it also contains the ultra-modern Docklands development which boasts some of Europe's most exciting architecture.

A veritable cultural treasure trove, east London's rich cultural and historic tapestry ensures there is always something new to see and experience.

Travel outside London

Whether exploring Britain, continental Europe or the rest of the world. London is the ideal place to start any journey. The city is a hub for the national network of roads and rail lines which connect the UK. Travel to Europe is easy with a wide choice of trains through the Channel Tunnel to Paris and Brussels, a range of cross-channel ferries and numerous international flights. London's airports are all easily accessible by rail.



Teaching and learning

As a Study Abroad student at Queen Mary, you will study in an environment renowned for the quality of its teaching and research.

Students at Queen Mary are taught by academic staff who are leading practitioners in their field, directly involved in contributing original thinking to their subjects and who regularly publish books and journal articles. Study Abroad programme participants study alongside full degree Queen Mary students from the UK and many other countries around the world.

The modular system

Although there are differences in academic systems around the world, there is much about the academic programme at Queen Mary that students find reassuringly familiar. All students are encouraged to take modules outside of their degree specialisations and many joint programmes run across the university. To make this possible, Queen Mary operates a flexible module model. For the Study Abroad programme this allows students the freedom to take modules from across the whole range of the College's academic departments. Students can choose to concentrate module selections within one department or take modules across different departments.

Choosing modules

Students normally take four modules per semester. When applying, students will be asked to select eight indicative module choices per semester in order of preference and to indicate which, if any, of these modules are required by their home institution. These selections are not set in stone and there is the option to change modules at pre-registration and, subject to availability, at enrolment on arrival at Queen Mary.

Teaching and learning

Subject areas

Queen Mary offers a wide range of academic modules across all departments and subject areas.

Study Abroad students can choose from modules in the following areas:

- Drama (includes both text and performance based modules)
- Film and Communication (includes: scriptwriting and production)
- Geography (includes: Environment and human geography)

- History (Includes: Art and Architectural History)
- International Relations
- Language Learning Unit (includes: French, German, Japanese, Italian)
- Law (includes: international, labour, EU and comparative)
- Linguistics
- Mathematics
- Modern Languages (includes: French, German, Italian, Portuguese, Russian, Hispanic Studies, Art and Architectural History, European Literature and Cultural studies, Latin American Literature and Cultural studies Linguistics)
- Physics (includes Astronomy and Astrophysics)
- Politics (includes: international relations and globalisation)

When I decided to take a Study Abroad year, the

logical destination for me as a History and Drama major was London. There is so much going on here in both areas and this is the only city I really considered. There were classes I knew I wanted to take and all the extra information I needed was on the website which was really useful.

Being so close to the city is really nice. I loved being able to go to the theatre and go out in the city, but then come back to campus and relax. One of the other things I really like about Queen Mary is that it is campus based – it feels like the school has its own space but I still had great access to central London. Another great scheme is 'Mums and Dads' run by the Students' Union, where new students get a 'family' on campus who are second or third year students; I see my 'dad' quite regularly and he has given me some great tips, including introducing me to my favourite restaurant!

Academically I really like the structure of classes here. You have maybe an hour of lecture a week per class, then an hour seminar in smaller groups. I really like the independent working here, and the reading and discussion, and meeting your professors three times a week is really good.

When I came to study here it was my first time in Europe. Orientation was a few days after I arrived and was really useful; students are given access to a lot of information before coming, when they arrive, and throughout their semester here. Throughout the semester the Study Abroad Office held several events for associate students; it was the perfect way to meet other Study Abroad students and make friends. I also went to the Superbowl party organised by the Students' Union which was a bit of home culture right here in London!

The best thing about Queen Mary is the access to the city. It's so easy and accessible that two or three times a week I was going into the city to museums and art galleries – there's just so much to see and do! I also like that the university offers on-campus accommodation to all Study Abroad students, which isn't available at other London schools. Another interesting thing about Queen Mary is that it has lots of clubs and societies which aren't available at most schools back home and these are great for social networking. I definitely think this semester has helped me with my future ambitions and has been worth every minute.



Applying to Queen Mary

Qualifications

Students are expected to have a cumulative GPA of 3.0 out of 4.0 on a 4.0 scale. However, applications from students with a slightly lower GPA may be considered, particularly if special circumstances apply. Applicants whose institutions use a different grading scale will be assessed on a case-by-case basis however guidelines on entry requirements for several different marking schemes are available on the website at www.gmul.ac.uk/international/ studyabroad/apply. Students must have experience of at least one year of university study prior to applying to the programme.

English language requirements

For students whose first language is not English, evidence of English language proficiency will be required at the application stage. Queen Mary accepts IELTS, TOEFLIBT, and PTE Academic; requirements vary depending upon the modules selected so please see the website for more information: www.gmul.ac.uk/international/ studyabroad/apply. Students who do not meet the English language requirements may be considered for the Study Abroad (with English) programme.

Applications

Queen Mary accepts applications from four sources:

1. Direct Applications from students at any university; Queen Mary application forms are available on the Study Abroad web-site website: www.gmul.ac.uk/international/studyabroad.

- 2. Via an institution which has an agreement for Study Abroad with Queen Mary; students should consult their home institution's Study Abroad adviser to see if this is the case and to check on any special application arrangements.
- 3. Through a Study Abroad programme. Queen Mary currently works with Arcadia University College of Global Studies, Butler University Institute for Study Abroad, Globalinks, IES, ISA, SUNY Brockport and Study Abroad Foundation (SAF): students should refer to publications issued by these organisations for application procedures.
- 4. Through Queen Mary's existing exchange agreements with international partner institutions.

Applications from all of these sources are considered equally on their own merits.

Applications for either the Full Year or Autumn semester are received and considered from January in the year of entry until 15 July; applications for the Spring semester are received and considered from May until 15 October of the year before the year of entry.

Applications will be considered after these dates if places are still available, however it is in the best interests of students to apply as early as possible. Applications are considered on a rolling basis as are requests for places on modules.

The completed application form should be accompanied by a recent transcript or record of studies and one confidential recommendation supplied by someone who has been acquainted with the applicant's academic work. These items can be mailed together or separately, however the recommendation must be in a separate sealed envelope. Applications will not be considered until all documentation is received.

Equal opportunities

Queen Mary welcomes students from all over the world. The College Charter states that the work of the College shall be carried out in a spirit of tolerance, freedom of opinion, mutual concern and community service, and undertakes to avoid discrimination against any person on the grounds of religion, race, sex or politics.

Study Abroad students with disabilities

Queen Mary University of London has a specialist service to support disabled students, including what is called in the UK 'specific learning difficulties', eg. dyslexia and dyspraxia. The Disability and Dyslexia Service (DDS) can provide a wide range of support, from additional time in examinations to access to assistive technology (such as text-to-speech software) to mentoring for students with mental health issues.

Students requiring advice, guidance or support should contact the Study Abroad office. To ensure support can be provided it is important that the Study Abroad office be notified of any support required as soon as possible. Students need to provide recent evidence of their disability written in English to ensure they can access the services Queen Mary offer.

The support on offer includes:

- Access to special examination arrangements, such as additional time (NB: students with specific learning difficulties, or what are often termed 'learning disabilities' are eligible for 25% additional time in the UK)
- Library concessions
- Access to the assistive technology suites across Queen Mary
- Access to a pool of loaned equipment
- Support in accessing on-campus accommodation.

Immigration Information

To travel to the UK students may be required to apply in advance for immigration permission to enter the country (usually called a visa). This depends on nationality, the length of the academic programme and whether or not students wish to work alongside their studies.

One semester students

Nationals of many countries can come to the UK either as a Tier 4 (General) Student or as a Student Visitor, Non-visa nationals who will be studying in the UK for one semester can either apply and pay £80 (2013 fee) for advance student visitor permission or can come to the UK as a student visitor without applying for immigration in advance.

Immigration permission as a Student Visitor is more limiting that Tier 4 (General) Student immigration permission. For example:

- Students cannot undertake any kind of work (paid or unpaid) or internships etc
- Permission will be granted for a maximum of six months
- Students cannot apply for more time from inside the UK (either as a visitor or as a Tier 4 (General) Student)
- Students will not normally be allowed to spend more than six months in any 12 month period in the UK as a visitor.

Students who wish to avoid the limitations of Student Visitor immigration permission, or who are from a country where a visa is required to

travel to the UK, may apply for Tier 4 (General) Student immigration permission instead.

Tier 4 (General) Student immigration permission

Students who are visa nationals (from countries where a visa is needed to travel to the UK) must apply for Tier 4 (General) Student immigration permission before being allowed to travel to the UK. Applications can be made at the British Visa Application Centre in the students' home countries or regions. A list of the centres can be found by visiting the UK Visas website: www.ukvisas.gov.uk/wheretoapply. To allow students to apply for Tier 4 (General) Student immigration permission Queen Mary will provide a Confirmation of Acceptance to Study (CAS). This is a unique number which enables the UK Border Agency to access information which the university has provided about the individual student's course of studv.

Travelling to the UK via the Republic of Ireland

For non-visa nationals who intend to apply for immigration permission on arrival in the UK, it is essential that travel is not via the Republic of Ireland, as there is no immigration control between here and the UK so it is not possible to make an application for Student Visitor immigration permission.

London – the world in one city



Nowhere is this more true than in east London, the vibrant area that is home to Queen Mary. The hub of London's creative and cultural community, east London represents the best of the city – steeped in history, yet always looking to the future, and uniquely British in its diverse character.

Due to its location on the River Thames, east London has long been the shipping and merchandising centre of the capital. As a consequence of its history as a port there is a long tradition of immigration, integration and shifting population that reveals itself in the changing architecture, culture, religion, commerce and industry of the area: synagogues converted to mosques; warehouses transformed into expensive riverside flats; pubs becoming wine bars and then reverting to pubs again. This religious, cultural and ethnic mix displays itself in a huge variety of shops, restaurants, cafes, bars and markets that would be hard to match anywhere else in the UK.
